

February 2, we observe the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, honoring Jesus Christ's presentation in the Temple when he was

a young child.

When the days were completed for their purification according to the law of Moses, Mary and Joseph took Jesus up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord, just as it is written in the law of the Lord, "Every male that opens the womb shall be consecrated to the Lord," and to offer the sacrifice of "a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons," in accordance with the dictate in the law of the Lord. ~Luke 2:22–24

Mary and Joseph were faithful Jews who obeyed the Law of Moses. Jewish Law prescribed that two ritual acts needed to take place for a firstborn son. First, the mother of a newborn son was ritually unclean for seven days, and then she was to "spend thirty-three more days in a state of blood purity" (Leviticus 12). During these forty days she was not to "touch anything sacred nor enter the sanctuary till the days of her purification are fulfilled." For this reason, today's feast has at times been called the "Purification of Mary." Second, the father of the firstborn son was to "redeem" the child by making an offering to the priest of five shekels so that the priest would then present the child to the Lord (see <u>Numbers 18:16</u>). Recall that the firstborn male of all the Egyptians, animals and children, was killed during the tenth plague, but the firstborn males of the Israelites were spared. Thus, this offering made for the firstborn son in the Temple was a way of ritually redeeming him in commemoration of protection during that plague. Since Jesus was presented in the Temple for this redemption, today's feast is now referred to as the "Presentation in the Temple."

"Candlemass" is also a traditional name given to today's feast because as early as the fifth century, the custom of celebrating this feast with lighted candles had developed. The lit candles symbolized Simeon's prophecy that Jesus would be "a light for revelation to the Gentiles." Lastly, this Feast has been referred to as the "Feast of the Holy Encounter" because God, in the Person of Jesus, encountered Simeon and Anna in the Temple.

Today's feast is celebrated in our Church forty days after Christmas, marking the day that Mary and Joseph would have brought Jesus into the Temple. Though Mary was pure and free from sin from the moment of her conception, and though the Son of God did not need to be redeemed, Mary and Joseph fulfilled these ritual obligations.

At the heart of this celebration is the encounter of Simeon and Anna with the Christ Child in the Temple. It is in that holy encounter that Jesus' divinity is manifested by a human prophet for the first time. At His birth, the angels proclaimed His divinity to the shepherds, but in the Temple, Simeon was the first to understand and proclaim Jesus as the Savior of the World. He also prophesied that this salvation would be accomplished by a sword of sorrow that would pierce the Immaculate Heart of Mary. Anna, a prophetess, also came forward and "gave thanks to God and spoke about the child to all who were awaiting the redemption of Jerusalem" (Luke 2:38). Thus, these ritual acts were also a moment in which Jesus' divine mission was made manifest to the world.

As we celebrate Mary's ritual purification and Jesus' ritual redemption, we should see them as acts in which we are called to participate. First, each of us is unworthy of entering the true Temple of the Lord in Heaven. Yet we are invited to enter that Temple in union with Mary, our Blessed Mother. It was her consent to the will of God that opened the door of God's grace to us all, enabling us to spiritually become Jesus' "mother" by allowing Him to be born in our hearts by grace. With her, we are now able to appear before God, purified and holy in His sight.

We must also see Saint Joseph redeeming us as he presented Jesus in the Temple. In offering Christ Jesus to the priest to offer Him to the Father, Saint Joseph also presents all who strive to live in union with Jesus. The hope is that, like Simeon and Anna, others will see God alive within us and experience the Savior of the World through us.

Ponder, today, your soul being the new temple of the Lord, and acknowledge your need to be purified and offered to the Father in Heaven. As Christ continues to enter into the temple of your soul, pray that He will shine forth for others to see so that, like Simeon and Anna, they will encounter our Lord within you.

My saving Lord, Your loving parents offered You to Your Father in the Temple in accordance with the Law You revealed to Moses. In that offering, our souls are purified and we are offered to Your Father with You. I thank You for the gift of salvation and pray that my soul will always radiate Your light as You dwell within me. Jesus, I trust in You. (From Hallows)

are blessed and consecrated. On Holy Thursday night, the church celebrates the Mass of the Lord's Supper, where we celebrate the Last Supper and the first Holy


Mass. On Good Friday, we celebrate the Passion of Christ where we read from the Passion Narrative

# RIDGE-BUILDER – A DEACON'S STORY – BENJAMIN SALIBA

Aiming to be a bridge-builder can be a great goal – and massively hard work. A builder's apprentice would slog away at the foundation earthworks, pouring concrete. Equally, the construction engineer would have several years of involved study and learning from those already in design trade. For Benjamin Saliba, the many years of training will be crowned on 6 August 2022, when he is **called to ordination as a Catholic priest** for God's People, in St. Mary's Cathedral, Sydney.

Communities have been critical for today's deacon, along his vocational road. Born into a strong Catholic family in suburban working-class Bankstown, his parents, Anne and Sam, "sacrificed a lot", he says in raising him and his brother to become men of respect, and religious faith. In Ben's Middle Eastern heritage and culture, family and community are central, so going to church on a Sunday was a "non-negotiable".

Ben's schooling was Lasallian, at De La Salle Bankstown in 1997 as a Year 7 boy. The school, transmogrifying into **La Salle Catholic College** the following year, had impact on his friendships, academic learning, and sports life, as he played representative basketball, volleyball and tennis. He was elected College Captain in 2002. Personal commitment grew with the responsibility and leadership duties.

His mother Anne could see that he was "well respected by his fellow students throughout primary and secondary". She notes Ben's dependability, and willingness to help others. He appreciated his teachers, with Mr. Michael Egan (Deputy) and Br. Ambrose Payne (Principal) as great supportive figures.

University studies in communications and public relations led to a ten-year career in architectural sales consultancy in an import business. As many a growing young man, religion was not strongly invested in through adolescence, but his national consultan-

cy role meant being on the road often. There was time for Ben to listen to faith talks on CD's. In addition, he was involved in his

Catholic parish's faith formation programs; this drew him back to his Christian faith more deeply.

Dissatisfaction with a purely secular lifestyle led him to offer **service, in a ministry**, on several overseas missions in the Philippines. This relationship with the international institute of "Missionaries of the Poor" occupied some months each year from 2013 to 2016. Decision time came with entering the Good Shepherd Seminary in Homebush in 2016.

Five years of education and short ministerial parish placements allowed further affirmation of his "vocation", with learning, prayer, and discernment, in relationships with many priests and several church communities. After ordination as **Deacon Ben**, he had a major 6-month placement at St Jerome's Punchbowl.

Join and attend meetings of the parish Liturgy and other committees in the parish.

Standing by to assist in a Parish recruitment drive.

Carry out work requested by the Parish Priest and parish activities which may include:

Managing the Piety goods stall. Welcoming parishioners to Sunday Mass.

Looking after altar linen, preparing for special feast days, e.g., decorating

Singing in choir, serving as acolyte at masses Dusting & regular house keeping of church furniture.

Help maintenance the cleanliness of toilets facility & church yard etc.

#### 4. Canberra Goulburn Curia

#### Works:

Home-to-home visitation by praesidia has resumed following Covid-19. Miraculous medals, Bulletins, devotional items and Catholic reading materials are offered. Ongoing home visits were made to practising, lapsed and non-Catholics, mainly house-bound and elderly.

Auxiliaries were visited and encouraged in their apostolate.

Several praesidia bring the Pilgrim Virgin statue/icon to families and facilitate family prayers, fostering devotion to Our Lady and a sense of community.

Two praesidia are active with "Enthronement of the Sacred Heart".

One praesidium regularly prays the rosary before Catholic funerals in two churches. Other praesidia have also prayed at funerals on request.

Three praesidia have been involved in the organisation of overnight adoration.

Rolling novenas on Zoom have been conducted jointly by two praesidia with several non-legion people joining.

A number of public rosaries have been held in various town centres and other localities and used to promote crowd contact.

Visits to nursing homes conducted by 3 praesidia.

Convalescent and general hospital patients were visited and have been well received.

Pamphlet stands were maintained in two churches.

Two praesidia led the Rosary after Saturday vigil and before Sunday afternoon masses.

One praesidium is providing transport to Mass for a parishioner.

Piety stores have been conducted by several praesidia.

Sacramental gift packs for children's first Holy Communion and Confirmation are provided by one praesidium.

Regular promotion and opening of church libraries by one praesidium.

RCIA program support by one praesidium.

One praesidium assists with children's liturgy during Sunday Mass.

Distribution of holy water undertaken by two praesidia

12 Providing Miraculous Medals with leaflets to children being Baptised

13.Reflection Days organised for legionaries led by Fr Manuel Santiago

Works of Service

1 Promoting daily/weekly adoration, providing transport for people to attend Mass, Eucharistic Adoration and legion meetings

2 Organising hospitality after Sunday Mass once a month to talk about and promote the Legion of Mary

3 Helping Mission by making knitted squares for blankets to be sent to the needy through Wrap with Love by two praesidia

4 One legionary produces the weekly parish bulletin and writes the Prayer of the Faithful for Sunday Mass
