



Special Praesidia for the Young



In our Legion's journey, Chapter 36 of the handbook highlights a crucial aspect: the formation and operation of praesidia specifically for young members, those under 18 years. This chapter is essential as it guides us on how to involve our youth in meaningful activities that not only align with our faith but also prepare them for future leadership roles.

Key Points from Chapter 36:

- 1. **Starting Young**: Praesidia for those under 18 need approval from the Curia, and sometimes special rules apply. This ensures everything is suitable for their age and beneficial for their growth.
- 2. **Learning by Doing**: The best way for our youth to understand the Legion is by actively participating, not just listening to talks. Practical involvement helps them grasp the essence of our mission and grow spiritually and socially.

3. **Adult Supervision**: Each junior praesidium should have at least one adult leader, preferably with Legion experience, to guide and inspire the young members. This adult presence ensures the praesidium runs smoothly and effectively.

4. **Education Through Action**: Since younger members might find the handbook challenging, leaders should focus on making discussions simple and engaging. Each meeting should include a lesson from the handbook explained in a way that everyone can understand.

5. **Adapting Activities**: Junior members can do many of the same tasks as adults, tailored to their capabilities. This includes distributing miraculous medals, teaching catechism, or even bringing peers to Mass. It's about giving them responsibilities that match their enthusiasm and potential.

6. **Building for the Future**: By engaging in these activities, young legionaries are not just doing work; they're training to be the future pillars of both the Legion and their own communities. The experience they gain now will empower them to lead and inspire others as they grow.

This chapter urges us to view our young members not just as participants but as integral parts of our community whose development is vital. By investing in them, we're nurturing future leaders who will carry forward the mission of the Legion with vigor and faith.

Fr. Richard Leonard Talks About Mental Health and Christian Hope at Women's Conference

At the latest Catholic Women's League conference, Fr. Richard Leonard spoke about the serious issues young people face today. He mentioned a report by the Federal Government showing that more young people are feeling very sad, anxious, and have low self-esteem.

Fr. Leonard criticized the modern obsession with always being happy and explained that it's okay to feel anxious sometimes and that feeling sad doesn't always mean you are depressed.


He discussed how society is focusing too much on what people do for work and how much money they make, and how young people feel more alone even though they are often online. He also talked about new problems like being addicted to technology and inappropriate content online.

Fr. Leonard encouraged Catholics to remember that we are all part of a big Christian family worldwide. He reminded us that even though a few have made mistakes, most people are trying their best. He talked about Jesus' promise of a joyful life and mentioned stories from the Bible about God caring for everyone, even when they feel lost or alone.

He also talked about St. Paul, who was brave in standing up for his beliefs even when many opposed him. St. Paul was flexible in how he spoke to different people and showed love through his actions.

Fr. Leonard finished by quoting Brian Grogan SJ, who said, "the best is yet to come," reminding us that our actions now help build our future in heaven.

This talk gave great insights on how Christians can bring hope to others, especially during tough times.
