

Our Lady of Perpetual Help

The Story Behind the Icon of Mercy and Comfort

The icon of *Our Lady of Perpetual Help* is one of the most beloved and well-known Marian images in the Catholic Church. This ancient icon is more than just a beautiful painting—it is a powerful reminder of Mary's constant care and intercession for us, especially in times of trouble.

The original icon is believed to have been painted in the 13th or 14th century in the Byzantine style, most likely in Crete. It was later brought to Rome, where it now resides in the Church of St. Alphonsus Liguori. According to tradition, the icon was stolen by a merchant and brought to Italy. After several mysterious events and visions, the Blessed Virgin requested that the icon be placed in a church "between the basilicas of St. Mary Major and St. John Lateran"—and so it was enshrined in that location in 1499.

In the icon, Mary is shown holding the child Jesus, who appears frightened. His sandal is hanging off one foot as He runs into His mother's arms, seeking safety. Why is He scared? Two angels—St. Michael and St. Gabriel—hover nearby, holding the instruments of His future Passion: the cross, nails, and spear. Even as a child, Jesus sees the suffering He will endure. He clings to His mother in fear, and she, calm and strong, holds Him firmly with love and protection.

Mary's eyes, however, are not focused on Jesus. She looks at us. Her gaze invites us to come to her, to bring our fears, our wounds, our prayers. She is not only the mother of Jesus—she is our mother too. The Greek letters on the icon identify the figures: MP-OY (Mother of God), IC-XC (Jesus Christ), and the names of the two archangels.

In 1866, Pope Pius IX entrusted the icon to the Redemptorist Fathers, asking them to "make her known throughout the world." Since then, devotion to Our Lady of Perpetual Help has spread across the globe, bringing hope to millions.

The message of the icon is clear: in moments of fear, struggle, and suffering, we can always run to Mary. She never stops helping. Her love is not just tender—it is strong, powerful, and ever present.

She Holds Us Still

When fear surrounds and hope is small, We run to her, who loves us all. Her arms are wide, her gaze is kind, A mother's help we always find.

She shows us Christ, her dearest Son, And walks with us till race is run. O Lady fair, so strong and true, We place our lives in care of you.

Regular Meetings of the Praesidium 25 May 2025

We have probably sat through meetings in the workplace or social groups that were dry and did not seem to achieve anything. Some of these experiences may have even led us to reconsider whether such activities were worthwhile at all.

Yet the Legion of Mary Handbook tells us that the regular weekly meetings of the praesidium are not only useful, but essential. It stresses, 'The meeting is to the work as the root is to the flower'. How can this be? Shouldn't the active work be more important than the meeting?

Such a statement would make sense if we consider what is actually involved in a Legion of Mary meeting. It is no coincidence that each meeting is framed around prayer. It begins with the invocation of the Holy Spirit, asking that the Father send us His Holy Spirit, and meditates on the life of His Son through the gaze of Mary in the Rosary. Then midway through the meeting, the *Catena Legionis* is recited to echo Mary's thankful hymn of praise to God. Finally, the meeting concludes with prayer again, this time asking the Lord to enliven each of us to fulfil our mission for His glory.

Praying together has the advantage of promoting communion between the members of the Legion of Mary and ensures the presence of Jesus as the point of unity to direct the discussions. For Jesus promised His disciples, "where two or three are gathered in my name, there am I in the midst of them." (Mt 18:20)

Additionally, each meeting provides a platform for the different works of each member to be presented in the context of a prayerful offering to God. Not only is one accountable for the works that one does, but that each legionary could rejoice and be encouraged in hearing about the works that God has done through others.

We can see then that each meeting is more than just an ordinary gathering. It is a prayer that enables the work of each legionary to be rooted in God. Only then will the flower truly blossom.



REPORTS FOR THE MONTH OF MAY 2025

Report from Cabramatta Curia for the period of Dec 2023 to May 2025.

Active works included: home to home visitation, visitation of auxiliaries, nursing homes & hospitals, taught scripture in schools, circulation of pilgrim statues, led eucharistic adoration, brought communion to sick and elderly, worked in CIC shop & parish piety stalls, provided transport to Mass, etc.

Report from Campbelltown Curia for the period 01 May 2024 to 30 April 2025.

Active works included: taught scripture in schools, brought holy communion to the house-bound, visitation to nursing homes, provided religious instructions to enquirer, circulation of pilgrim statues, organized rosters for rosary prayers and eucharistic devotions, reestablishment of a praesidium, etc.

Report from Camperdown Praesidium for the period May 2024 to May 2025.

Active works included: brought holy communion to sick & elderly, led rosary and divine mercy devotions, organized rosters of readers & their training, managed choir and recruitment, home to home visitation, visitation to hospitals and nursing homes, crowd contact, taught scripture in schools, volunteered at marriage enrichment seminar, circulation of pilgrim statue, worked in CIC shop, distributed parish pamphlets to hotels, recruitment of auxiliaries and active members, organized flower ministry, etc.

St. Thérèse of Lisieux


The Little Flower Who Loved Greatly

St. Thérèse of Lisieux, also called *The Little Flower*, was born on January 2, 1873, in Alençon, France. She was the youngest of nine children, though only five daughters survived childhood—and all five became nuns! Her parents, St. Louis and St. Zélie Martin, are now canonized saints too.

Thérèse was very close to her family. When her mother died of cancer, she was only four years old. This was a deep wound for her, and she became very sensitive and emotional. She would cry easily and often felt afraid. But slowly, with prayer and her family's love, she learned to trust in Jesus and in Mary.

From a young age, Thérèse felt called to give her whole life to God. At just 15 years old, she asked the Pope for special permission to enter the Carmelite convent in Lisieux.

Her faith and persistence touched many, and she was finally accepted.



She would smile when others misunderstood her. She forgave quickly, accepted daily annoyances as gifts to God, and always showed kindness—even when it was hard. Her strength was her deep love for Jesus and her complete trust in Him.

In her final years, Thérèse became very sick with tuberculosis. She suffered greatly but remained full of peace. Even when she felt far from God, she chose to trust. Her last words were full of love:

"Oh, I love Him... my God... I love You!"

She died on September 30, 1897, at just 24 years old. After her death, her writings in *Story of a Soul* touched hearts all over the world. People saw that holiness is not about doing big things—but about love, trust, and humility.

In 1925, Thérèse was declared a saint, and in 1997, she was named a **Doctor of the Church**—an amazing honor for such a young woman. Today, she is one of the most loved saints in the Catholic Church.




We are truly blessed to have Fr. Dominic with us. Let us keep him in our prayers as he begins this journey with the Legion of Mary family in Sydney.

Handbook Revisited

Confidentiality Of Paramount Importance Chapter 19.20 pp123

"Keeping Secrets = Keeping Trust"



In every Legion of Mary meeting, members give a weekly report. They tell about the people they visit, their situations, and sometimes their struggles with faith. This information is private.

The **Handbook** tells us: keeping confidentiality is very important.

Sharing private things from the meeting with people outside is not a small mistake—it is betrayal. It shows disloyalty to the praesidium and the mission of Mary.

Why is confidentiality important?

1. Because people trust us.

When someone shares something personal, they trust that we will respect them.

2. Because we are one team.

The praesidium needs full reports to give the right advice or help. If we hide information, the team becomes weak.

3. Because trust builds peace.

If people are afraid their words will be repeated, they will stop speaking. The meeting will lose its love and unity.

What about "being kind" and not reporting things?

Sometimes people think: "It's more loving not to say the name or report something negative."
But the **Handbook** says this is wrong. It is not real charity if it makes the praesidium unable to help others.

Legionaries are not priests. We don't hear confessions. What we hear in visits is often known already in the area. We still need to report—but with respect and care.

If the situation is really serious or private, we can speak to the **Spiritual Director** for advice.

What if someone breaks confidentiality?

The solution is not to stop reporting.

The solution is to **correct** or even **remove** the person who betrayed the trust.

Bible Verse to Reflect On:

"Whoever can be trusted with little can also be trusted with much."

- Luke 16:10

Q & A

Q1: Why is confidentiality important in the Legion of Mary?

A1: Because people trust us, and we need trust to work as a team.

Q2: What could happen if someone shares private stories outside the meeting?

A2: People could feel hurt or ashamed. It can damage the Legion's good name.

Q3: How can we help each other keep confidentiality?

A3: We remind one another gently, and pray to speak with care and love.

Q4: Have you ever felt unsure about what to report? What did you do?

A4: Yes, sometimes. I tried to report with respect. If I wasn't sure, I asked for help.

Help me to be careful with my words.


Teach me to protect the stories people share with love and respect.

The Bamboo and the Gardener



Sometimes, in order to give life, we must first be broken.

Reflection:

He may strip away comfort.

He may allow pain.

Not to punish us, but to prepare us.

When we allow ourselves to be *hollowed*—to be emptied of ego, selfishness, and fear—God can flow through us.

Like the bamboo, we may feel we've lost everything. But in truth, we've become *a channel of grace*.
